

"As a form, we picked Mary Seacole as our female role model. We picked her because she was kind and hard-working, just as any inspiration should be. Mary Seacole's actions weren't recognised until recently, however she did write a book about her life called 'The Wonderful Adventures of Mrs Seacole in Many Lands'. The book talks about her experiences during the Crimean War - where she was rejected after offering her help as a nurse, just because she was half Scottish and half Jamaican. Mary didn't let that stop her, causing her to build her own hospital. She helped everyone, no matter which side they fought for, treating all those who were injured. She also provided warm clothes and food, opening a shop selling fruit and vegetables. When Mary returned to Britain after the war, she had no money left as she spent it all helping the soldiers. Fortunately, Mary's kindness was not forgotten, with people donating money and food to ensure Mary never went cold or hungry.

Because of Mary's resilience and courage, she managed to save numerous lives, She never gave up and always tried her best. That is why we chose her as our form's role model."

"We use buses every day to go to school or into town. It's not unusual, but this story is about a bus journey that changed millions of lives.

Let's go to America, in 1955, to Montgomery in the southern state of Alabama.

There, when a woman called Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat, a bus journey that became very important.

Rosa's refusal was a protest about racism against black people. Racism is when someone thinks you're not as good as them because the colour of your skin or your race is different to theirs, so they treat you differently.

At that time, southern states in America, had something called 'segregation'. This meant people of different skin colours had different schools, restaurants, even toilets. Segregation happened on buses too.

One day, Rosa was in a seat for black people, but white people's seats were full. The bus driver wanted Rosa to give her seat to a white person, but Rosa said no!

Rosa was a member of a civil rights group which fought for black and white people to be treated the same.

She was arrested and taken to jail for a few hours.

Rosa didn't fight alone, people organised a bus boycott, which meant they stopped using buses for a year. They walked instead. This bus company lost a lot of money. The boycott was a peaceful stand against racism. Judges eventually said having separate black and white parts of buses was not allowed.

"Hello, friends of freedom. It's a wonderful day and let us be thankful we have reached this point and we will go farther from now to greater things. Thank you!"

Today, Rosa Parks is remembered as an ordinary woman who took a stand to help black people in America be treated fairly. To be treated the same as whites."

PARENT INFORMATION: Malicious Communication

Malicious Communications has been an ongoing problem we have experienced nationally. Online behaviour is something we talk regularly to children and young people about across the county within our online safety sessions. We want to also make sure parents are aware of these laws and the potential consequences our online behaviour can have in the real world and for our children's futures. Attached is a document which outlines the different laws regarding online behaviour, this is to accompany our video aimed at parents **Stay Safe Talks - Malicious Communications (youtube.com)/ (https://www.youtube.com/watch?**

<u>v=Akl9CgpP9t8We</u>) and would appreciate parents/ carers viewing this material.

<u>PARENT WORKSHOP "How to keep your autistic child safe from online radicalisation".</u> This is a free online workshop, designed specifically for parents, carers, and those who provide direct support for neurodiverse children, particularly males.

The workshop contents will include:

- Understanding the specific vulnerabilities of young males with ASD or other neurological conditions which makes them particularly susceptible to radicalisation.
- Identify when a young person in your care, or who you support, is at risk of online radicalisation.
- Provide the skills and knowledge to intervene directly in an appropriate way to safeguard the young person.

Know how to seek further support in mitigating that risk. Workshop dates are yet to be planned but are likely to be during April / May, held online, for approximately two hours. We welcome any feedback on what times of day would be most suitable for these to take place. You have been commissioned by an independent store to explore 'streetwear' and develop product ideas for them. You will then design and make a high quality prototype sweat top/hoody that incorporates printed images to represent your unique ideas for branding/logos/decoration. You will work with a client of your choice to gain feedback throughout the process.

The result is a fantastic range of individually designed and made hoodies. Images/logos have been computer designed and added using the sublimation printer and heat press. Additional decoration has been hand stitched to enhance the designs. Use of knitted fabrics is challenging and I hope you agree that the students have done a great job! They are proud to show off their finished hoodies.




