



University Applications Timeline

<u>Year 12</u>

- Early in Year 12 Students given information regarding progression routes and start to research their options
- April UCAS Information Evening in School for students and parents
- July Personal Statement Writing Day in School

<u>Year 13</u>

- End of September School deadline for priority deadline applicants (Oxbridge/Medicine/Veterinary Medicine/Dentistry)
- Mid October Official deadline for priority deadline applicants
- Beginning of November School deadline for all other applicants
- Mid January Official deadline for all other applicants
- Early May Students choose a firm and insurance university
- August Results day. Students find out if they have gained a place at their firm or insurance choice university or if they are eligible for clearing.

<u>Attendance</u>

The government has reduced the persistent absence threshold from 15% to 10%.

90% attendance =

- ½ day missed every week
- 4 whole weeks missed in a year
- 100 lessons missed
- Over 5 years = ½ a school year missed
