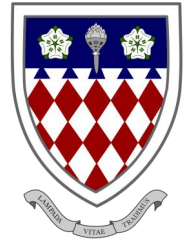


# Spalding High School

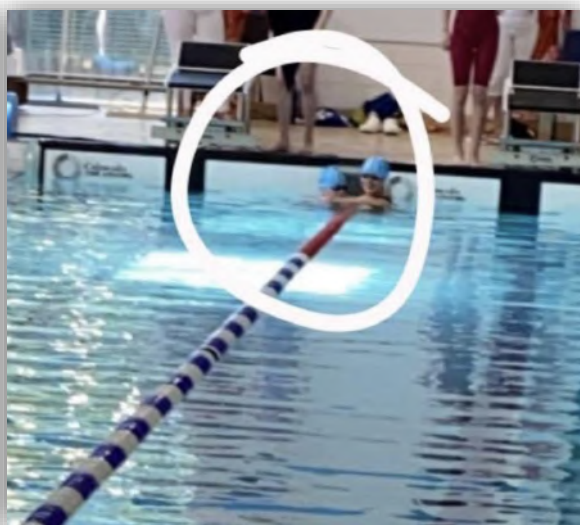
## Celebrating the Individual in Year 9 – Sophia Shackleston

## Staff News

### The Lap

My first ultramarathon, The Lap.

There must be easier ways to see the Lake District!

After school on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> September, the first weekend of the new academic term, I set off to face the biggest physical challenge I have taken on to date. Not satisfied with running the London Marathon in April this year, I decided it was time to tackle my first ultramarathon. My chosen event was 'The Lap', an anti-clockwise 47mile route around Lake Windermere with nearly 3000m of elevation. I was fortunate to have my daughter, an experienced ultrarunner, to accompany me on my journey.



We arrived at Low Cunsey Farm, on the edge of Lake Windermere, in the dark and put up our tent before completing our registration, kit check and having trackers fitted to our running vests. After very little sleep (I was very excited and nervous!) we got up at 4am to prepare for the 5.45am race briefing before the start at 6am. It was dark and misty and so our adventure began in head torches with around 650 other runners and walkers.

It was a very hot and humid day with very little breeze and so the weather proved to be an additional challenge. Seven aid stations positioned around the route provided very welcome places to fuel and fill water bottles before setting off on our way again. At the village of Troutbeck, approximately the halfway point, there was even a pizza van providing food for runners. I have come to the conclusion that ultrarunning is like going on a very long picnic with lots of exercise along the way!

Our route included seven summits and two named Wainwright Fells; Wansfell Pike and Loughrigg Fell. The route included areas of woodland, rocky terrain, villages to pass, and running through the town centre of Ambleside. The Lake District is one of my favourite places to be and so I was in my element in the mountain environment with fabulous views to take my mind off the physical effort of what I was doing. The people that we met along the way were friendly and encouraging, including one family providing ice poles to runners passing the end of their driveway.

Our final two hours were completed in the dark and so again we had to wear head torches. It was a special sight to see headtorches on other runners in the distance and to know that we were not still out alone in the dark. At 10.30pm we completed our challenge with a sprint to the finish line. I was relieved and exhausted but left feeling incredibly proud of our achievement, completing the race in 16:33:02. I was placed 389<sup>th</sup> out of 542 finishers with 88 participants not completing the event due to injury or exhaustion.

After a second night in our tent, we woke up to very sore legs and feet, ready to make the journey home to Lincolnshire in time to rest and prepare for a return to Spalding High School the following morning.

Did I enjoy the experience? Yes.

Was it difficult? Yes, incredibly difficult.

Would I do it again? Yes, most likely and as the clockwise event in May is the slightly easier route, with quicker finishing times, I would like to improve on my time!

This week, the Year 13 geographers are on an excursion to the Lake District for their fieldwork. We hope they are having a fabulous time and working hard!







**Lincolnshire Parent Carer Forum**

**PROMOTING POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR**

Certain types of behaviour can be not only highly stressful for the family, but also take up so much time and resources that they can have a large impact on the family and child engaging in everyday activities.

This session will look at:

- What are behaviours of concern.
- The types of behaviours that may be displayed (such as verbal and physical aggression, breaking objects, escape and avoidance and self-neglect).
- What happens physically to a child when displaying these behaviours.
- How to establish what the behaviour may be telling us.
- Why they may happen.
- How to put a plan into place, as well as some strategies that may help reduce such behaviours and promote positive ones.

## Oxbridge Support for Students

This week I have sent out information to students in Years 12 and 13 about Oxbridge applications. Representatives from the Admissions and Outreach Team, Andrew (Lincoln College, Oxford) and Ellie (Christ's College, Cambridge), will once again be collaborating to deliver webinar sessions specifically for students in **Lincolnshire, North Lincolnshire and North East Lincolnshire** in early November.

There are 'Introduction to Oxbridge' sessions for Year 12s which include advice about how to prepare during this year to apply to highly-selective universities:

These sessions are the same - students only need to attend one but they are strongly encouraged to attend live.

### **Year 13s – for those who have applied to Oxford or Cambridge**

- **6 November 2023, 17:00-18:00:** Interviews Webinar for Year 13 applicants - STEM (Sciences, Engineering, Mathematics, Computer Science courses excluding Vet/Medicine)
- **7 November 2023, 17:00-18:00:** Interviews Webinar for Year 13 applicants - Medicine, Veterinary Medicine
- **8 November 2023, 17:00-18:00:** Interviews Webinar for Year 13 applicants - Social Sciences - e.g. Geography, Law, HSPS, Psychology/PBS, Architecture, PPE
- **9 November 2023, 17:00-18:00:** Interviews Webinar for Year 13 applicants - Arts - e.g. English, History, Languages, Classics, Music, Philosophy, Theology, ASNC

Students are encouraged to attend sessions live and there will be temporary recording access for those students who cannot attend. As these sessions are solely for students in the region, this should give them a great opportunity to familiarise themselves with Andrew and Ellie as a contact and friendly face, as well as ask lots of questions.

We are pleased to announce that **Spalding High School** has organised a clothes and shoe collection with Bag2School.

**Bag2School is the UK's leading textile recycler and fundraiser working with schools and since its inception in 2001, it has now paid out over £36 million.**

As well as raising vitally needed funds for **Spalding High School**, it also helps the environment by helping to divert unwanted textiles away from landfill. A recent DEFRA report has shown that textile collection schemes are helping to reduce the volume of textiles discarded as municipal solid waste. However, it is a fact that, as a nation, we still send 350,000 tonnes of textiles to landfill every year.

By getting involved in our **Bag2School** collection, you have an opportunity to sort through your cupboards and wardrobes and donate unwanted textiles in the bag provided – this can include adults' and children's clothes, shoes (tied together please), hats, belts, handbags and soft toys, (please refer to <http://uk.bag2school.com/> for full details). In addition to raising much needed funds it will also raise awareness amongst the children of the benefits of recycling and reuse.
