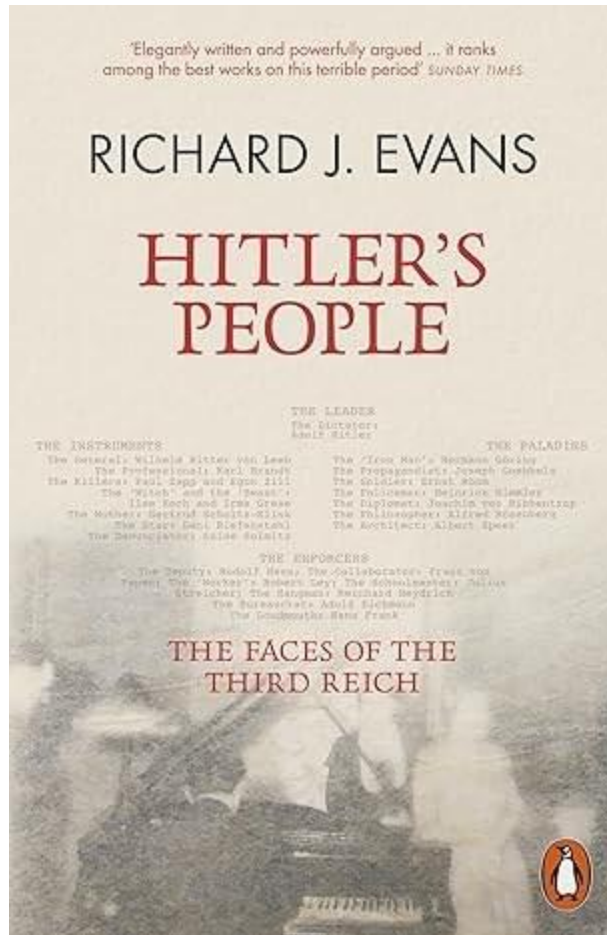

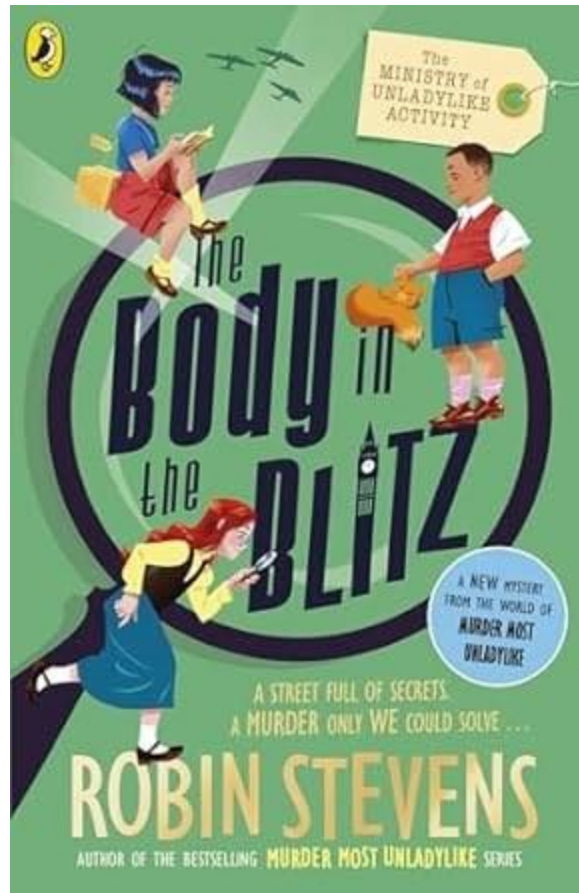


6 - Hitler's People by Professor Sir Richard J Evans (2024)

A thorough biographical account of key figures in the Third Reich (Nazi Germany), Evans moves beyond the traditional approach of viewing Nazis through the lens of insanity or evil to better understand how and why they did what they did. In particular, highlighting their cultural and social background, and the common thread of mishaps in their life (injury, family bankruptcy, loss of job etc) that preceded their move into extremist politics.

This scholarly work is very accessible to the committed GCSE or A Level student, and is written by one of the most pre-eminent historians of modern history.

Year 11 and Year 13 Art Trip – Tate Modern, London, Tuesday 23rd September 2025

Last week we had our annual Year 11 and Year 13 trip to the Tate Modern in London for our Art and Photography students. This is a really exciting venue to visit, with a wealth of amazing artworks for students to see up close and draw from in real life. Students were able to explore the gallery's permanent collection, and experience a wide variety of both contemporary and traditional artists, ranging from drawing, painting, sculpture, multi-media, film, photography, installation and more. Definitely something for everyone! The timing of this trip is excellent for both year groups embarking on their sustained coursework project, which equates to 60% of their final grade. They were able to record their day through drawing and photography, and make notes on potential artists and themes to inspire their individual projects. Student behaviour and etiquette around the gallery was excellent throughout, and it was a pleasure to run the trip for such a positive, mature and responsible group of students, we can't wait to see what you do next in your projects!

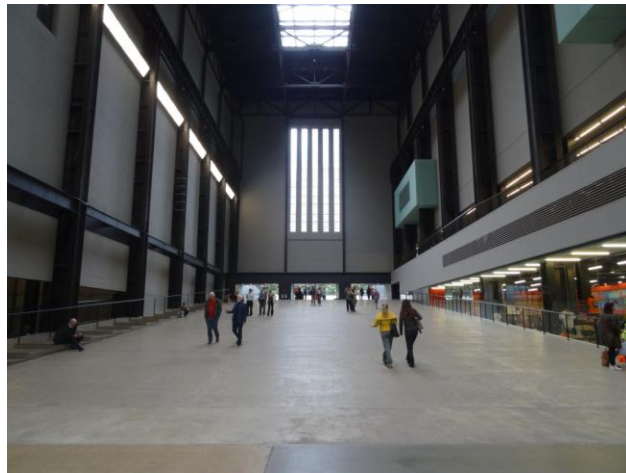
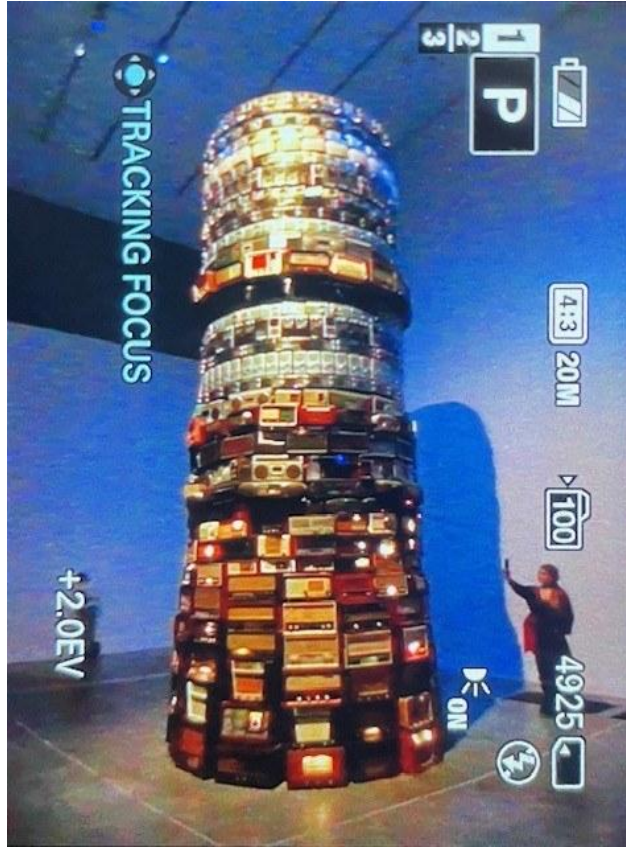

We are pleased to announce that Spalding High School has organised a clothes & shoe collection with Bag2School.

Bag2School is the UK's leading textile recycler and fundraiser working with schools and since its inception in 2001 it has now paid out over £36 million.

As well as raising vitally needed funds for Spalding High School, it also helps the environment by helping to divert unwanted textiles away from landfill. A recent DEFRA report has shown that textile collection schemes are helping to reduce the volume of textiles discarded as municipal solid waste. However it is a fact that as a nation we still send 350,000 tonnes of textiles to landfill every year.
