This week, from Mrs Anderson, Headmistress

Last night, hundreds of Year 11 students from across the local area attended the High School Sixth Form Information Evening. The School was buzzing and it was a delight to see staff and current Sixth Formers enthusiastically talking about their subject with the next potential generation of A Level students.

I am pleased that so many students are currently considering the School for their post-16 education, and I hope that what they saw and heard will confirm that a decision to come to the Sixth Form is the correct one. We have an automatic progression route for all of our current Year 11 students providing the Sixth Form admission criteria are met. Students currently studying at other schools will also find a route here and increasing numbers year on year make this their school of choice.

Clearly, as a grammar school, academic excellence is at the heart of what we do. We have an inspiring range of subjects on offer and engaging, passionate teachers who thrive at Sixth Form level and really bring their subjects to life. We have further courses available in an Enrichment Block, allowing students to broaden their horizons and enhance their CV without sacrificing one of their valuable A Level slots. This may be a complementary academic subject, an extended project or something more practical.

Our aim is that we continue to provide consistently first-class outstanding education for students – not just academic qualifications but the whole package. The Sixth Form is more than the academic.

It is about fully rounded individuals with a diverse range of extracurricular opportunities and excellent pastoral support that students have available to them. Students are also individually supported through our Careers provision so that they are best placed to make an informed decision about their futures after the Sixth Form. For most students, this will be transition to university and the School has outstanding UCAS guidance, advice and support. Students are also supported into other progression routes such as increasingly popular degree apprenticeships, employment-based training schemes and the world of work.

This is an exciting time for Sixth Form provision in Spalding! Our community extends beyond just these four walls, and we are delighted to be working ever closer with our brother school, Spalding Grammar in co-teaching and sharing a number of A Level subjects. This already works successfully in a number of subject areas and, for many years, we have co-taught Latin, Music, French, German, Spanish, English, Business and Economics and both schools look forward to working with each other more and more in the future

The collaboration gives us greater flexibility for meeting student subject choices. It is educationally beneficial to have students working together in bigger mixed groups and also enables us to continue delivering subjects which might traditionally recruit smaller numbers. We cannot, at this stage, guarantee which courses will be co-taught as it depends on your choices. If, by co-teaching a subject,

we can ensure it runs we will do our best to make that happen. The final confirmed list will be made once we have all of your application forms in and know what you want to study.

Both schools encourage students to attend both open evenings, and both taster days in January not least of all because we cannot confirm yet where the subjects will be co-taught and it is important that you meet the staff at both schools who may be teaching you. Spalding High and Spalding Grammar have standardised entry requirements and a joint common application form which is through Microsoft Forms after the January Taster Days.

Our collaboration means that students who want to study in Spalding can stay in Spalding doing the subjects they want to study.

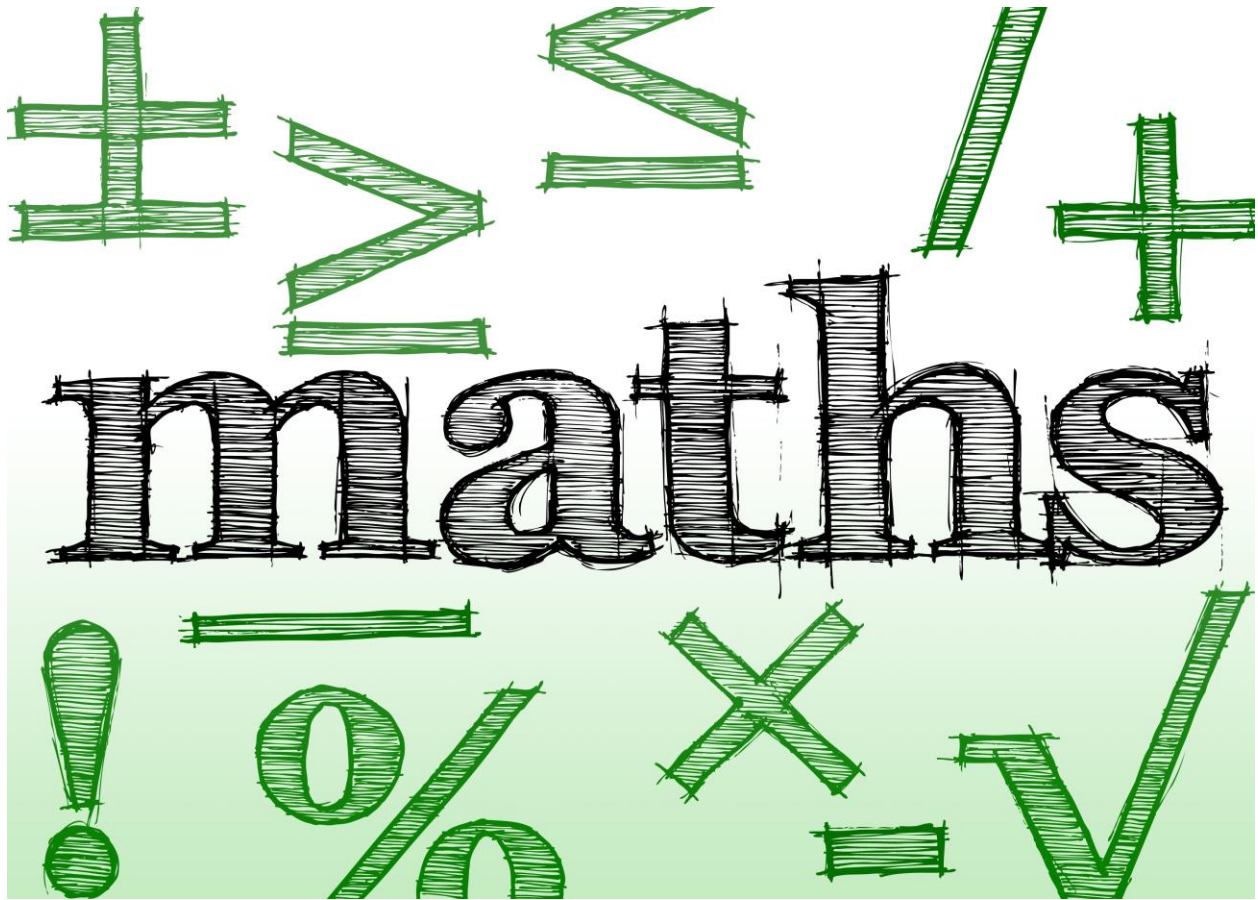

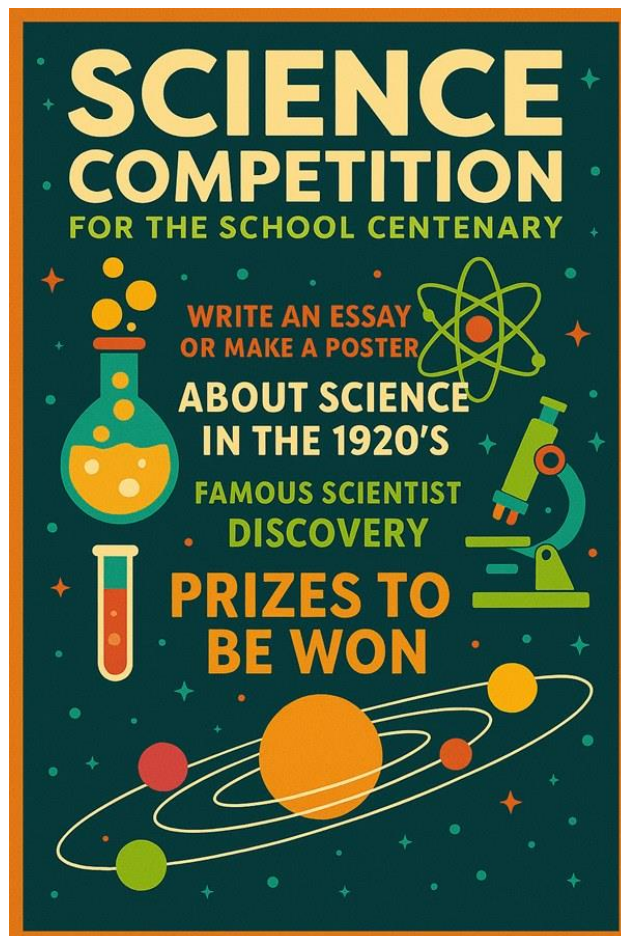

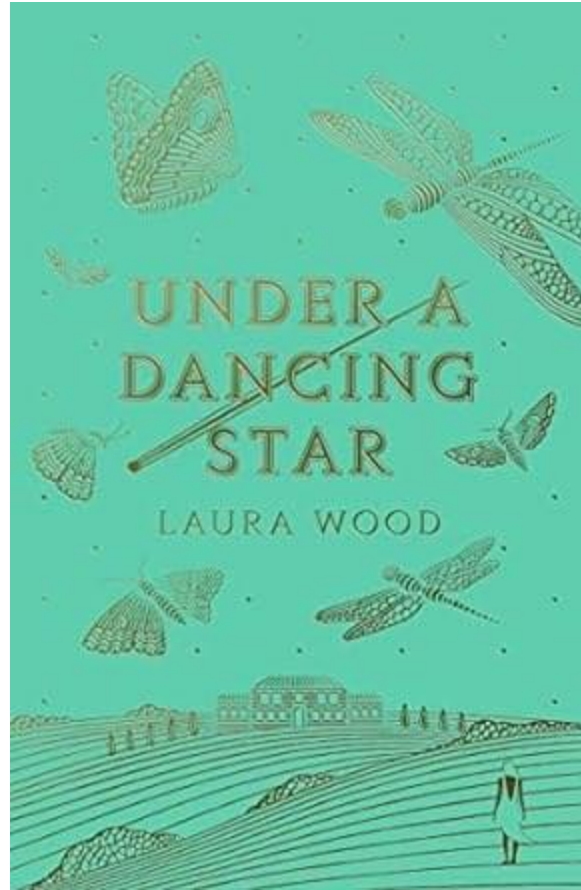
Our book clubs are off to a fantastic start and it has been wonderful to have so many students (both familiar faces and new additions) join us!

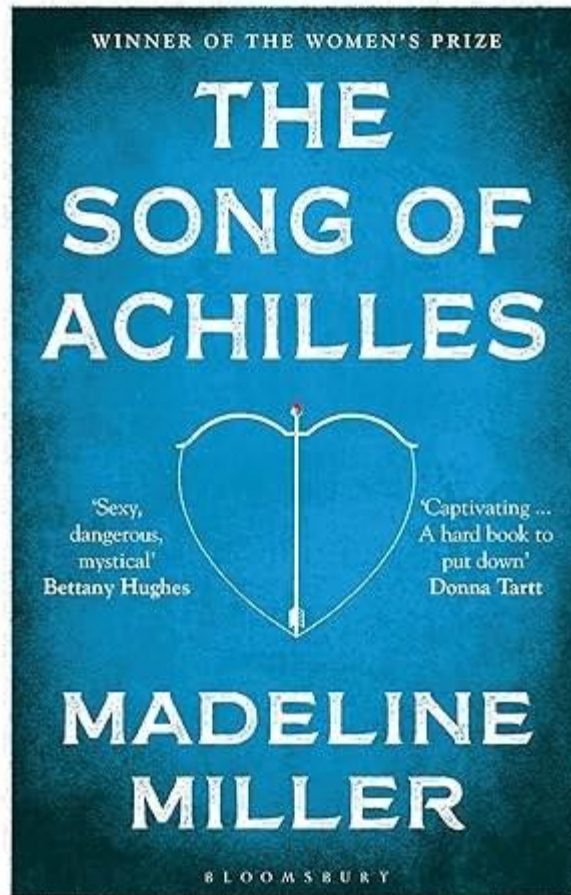


Under a Dancing Star by Laura Wood

This is by far one of the best books I have ever read. The story follows Bea, a young woman from a struggling aristocratic family in 1930's England. Bea refuses to follow the societal norms that are expected of her, and she ends up being sent to live with her bohemian uncle and his glamorous fiancée in Italy. Italy is all Bea ever wanted, far different from the dreary, grey country she is used to. Bea immediately clashes with Ben, a young artist who is working with her uncle. But, as they spend more and more time together, Bea realizes that maybe Ben isn't so bad after all.

This book is a beautiful mix of many different genres, combining enemies to lovers with fake dating. I really enjoyed the representation of Bea not wanting to fit those expectations of her, and her wanting to choose her own path in life. The story has very good setting for the time period, mentioning the scandal of women wearing trousers and the rise of Italian Fascist leader Mussolini. I also enjoyed how I was thrust straight into the story, and rather than being given all the key information at the start, I learnt things about each character along the way, like I was getting to know them. The Song of Achilles by Madeline Miller

At the beginning of Year 8, I chose this book as my first to read for my scheme. I put it into my award winning section and even though it took a while to get into, it was definitely worth it. As I finished the book, I felt the pull to reread it again and again. At this point in time, I have reread *The Song of Achilles* three times and it never fails to make me cry and smile.

The Song of Achilles is written by Madeline Miller and is an LGBTQ+ romance between Achilles, son of the sea nymph Thetis and Peleus the king of the Myrmidons, and his chosen companion Patroclus, son of Menoetius, whose mother was married off to Menoetius when she was just fourteen.

The book is written from the perspective of Patroclus, whose father is constantly pressuring him to be better. Patroclus is exiled to Phthia after accidentally killing a nobleman's son, where he then meets his love interest, Achilles. After Achilles chooses Patroclus as his companion, the two train and learn together, trying to avoid Thetis' negative influence as she is very unhappy with Achilles' choice of companionship. They eventually have to go to war together, to support Agamemnon as he attempts to retrieve his brother Menelaus' wife, Helen, from Troy. Tragedy strikes as Patroclus puts on Achilles' armour and goes out to fight instead of him.

Overall, I truly enjoyed this book and it helped me get back into reading for enjoyment. I would recommend this book to anyone and everyone as even though the book is centred on romance the ending is tragic. It is really incredibly written, as is anything by Madeline Miller.

Classics News



Classics trip to the British Museum and The Bacchae at the National Theatre

On the 29th of October, students from years 8-13 travelled to London with the main purpose of watching a Greek play, The Bacchae.

After leaving Spalding at 7am on a drizzly, grey autumnal morning, the first stop on our agenda was the British Museum. The museum is filled with incredible artefacts from all over the world and we looked especially at the Greek and Roman exhibits, despite their contentious presence in the UK.

Rather unexpectedly the fire alarm went off, which required a partial evacuation but that did not detract from the time spent at the museum where students were happily engaged with a scavenger hunt, prepared by Charlotte, a Year 13 Classics prefect. There was also a best photo and best team name competition. The winners were the Maenads with a stunning picture of the East pediment Parthenon statues.



The Bacchae is an Ancient Greek play written by Euripides centred around the God of Theatre, Dionysus, return to Thebes to reunite with his mortal mother's family and finally get them to recognise and honour him as a god. Dionysus was born from the Theban princess, Semele, who died after his father, Zeus revealed his true form to her, causing Zeus to place Dionysus in his thigh to continue growing, hence why Dionysus is known as the 'twice born god.' Upon his return, Dionysus realises his family are still refusing to acknowledge his god status, so he puts all of the Theban women under his spell, causing them to abandon their homes and flee to Mount Cithaeron to worship him as the maenads (the mad women). The mad women included Semele's own sister, Agave, mother of Pentheus. Pentheus, The King of Thebes, refuses to acknowledge Dionysus as a god and orders his capture. Even after being imprisoned, Dionysus escapes his cell and exerts his influence over Pentheus, causing him to abandon his original principles and go to the mountainside to see the maenads, and his mother, for himself. Pentheus is spotted by the women, who then tear him apart, with Agave being the one who takes her own son's head without realising what she has done.

The play we went to see had been adapted from the original Greek text to a more modern version, bringing in key political themes from today that are relevant to the original story, alongside more modern language and relatable audience references. The chorus (a group of singers and dancers) were dynamic and lively women who told the story through song and dance, just as it would have been done in the ancient times, except with a more modern rap style in their songs.

One of the main features of the performance was the three-tiered, movable stage, which could be shifted depending on who was on the scene, visually reflecting the tone and characters.

When the maenads (the mad women that made up the chorus) were on stage the three tiers were moved to be stacked haphazardly on top of one another, symbolising the chaos on stage. On the other hand, during the scenes inside Pentheus' palace, the stage was stacked neatly, symbolising the order of the palace which has a clear structure. Alongside the stage were multiple ceiling hung props, including a large, white horse puppet, a wardrobe filled with dresses for Pentheus to disguise himself as a maenad, and a moveable tree branch for Pentheus to perch himself on.

It was a brilliant day out, and everyone who went definitely enjoyed the show, whether it was the songs, jokes, or acting, it kept us all engaged and entertained for an hour and forty-five minutes!

Sadly the show only ran until the 31st October.

Celebrating the Individual: Joellyn, Year 13



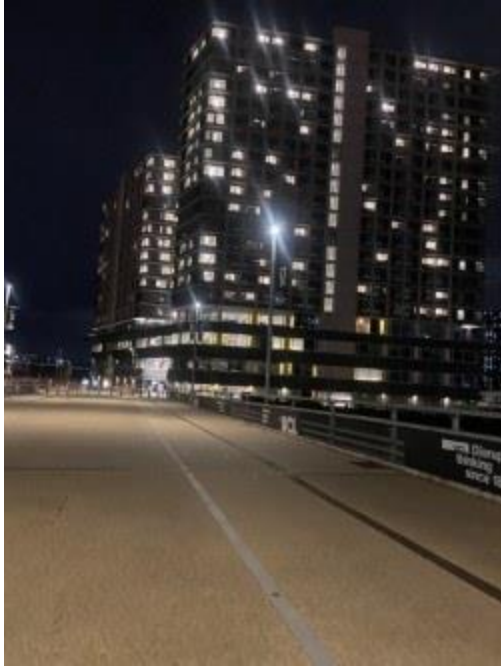
A huge congratulations is in order for one of our students, Joellyn, who recently had the incredible opportunity to perform with the UK's National Youth orchestra and their Inspire program.


