On Wednesday 4th March Year 12 girls took part in an exciting T1 Rugby training session designed to help them learn the fundamentals of coaching and leading a game. The session focused on building confidence, understanding the rules of T1 Rugby, and developing the skills needed to organise and run a successful game for younger players.

During the training, students practised setting up drills, explaining rules clearly, and guiding players through different game situations. They also explored the role of a referee, learning how to make fair decisions and keep games running smoothly. 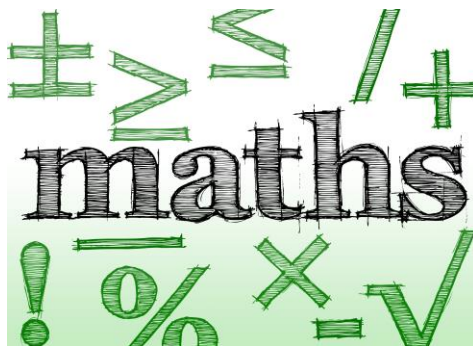
They represented the School exceptionally well through their attitude, teamwork and commitment. Achieving third place is a fantastic achievement.

The best individual scores were achieved by Jess in Year 9, Olivia in Year 10, and Olivia in Year 11.

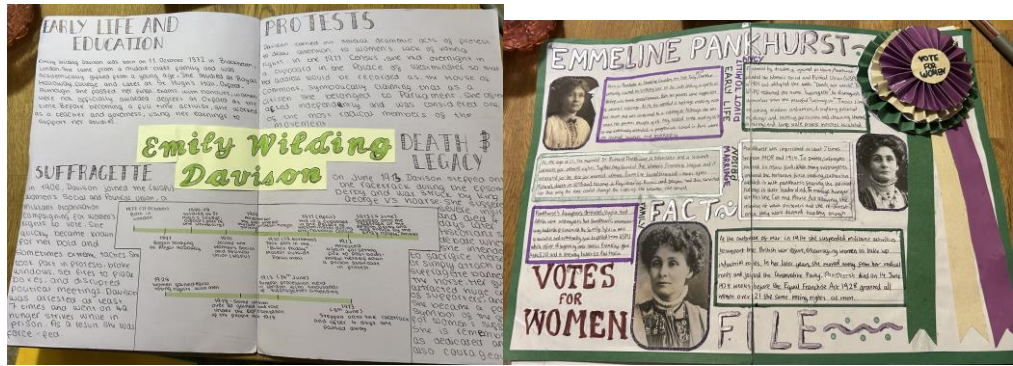
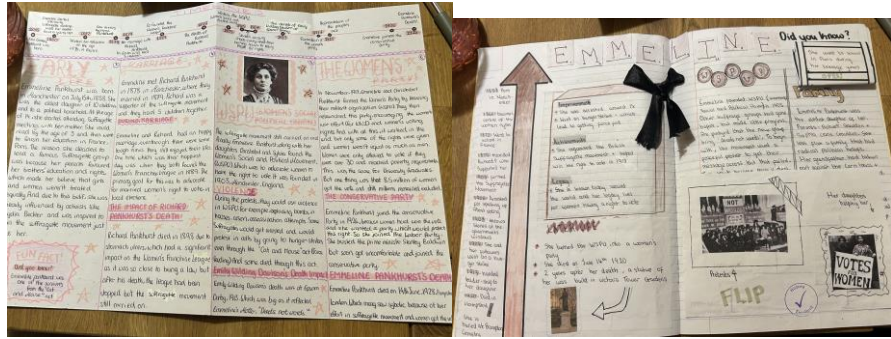
Four students - Olivia, Morgan, Ava and Olivia - have qualified for the next round, the Pink Kangaroo, which they will sit next week- good luck!

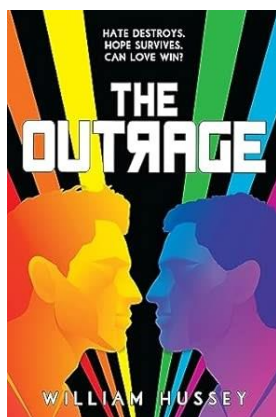

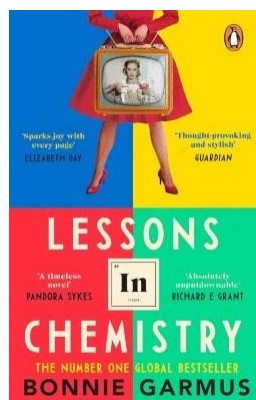
Book reviews



The Outrage by William Hussey

Do you ever feel like a dystopian thriller if so I've got the right book for you... THE OUTRAGE!!! In this eye catching story, two boys Eric and Gabe have an irreplaceable love for each other. But unluckily for them, there has been a terrorist attack which had been blamed on the 'Degens' (a negative term for being a member of the LGBTQ + society). Consequently, it is forbidden, in fact illegal to love who you truly love, regardless of gender. Up to the point where anything suggesting even a hint towards this 'devious' idea will be persecuted or even worse be put in 'safe, therapeutic' camps.
