## Fidgets

We would like to clarify our approach to fidget items in school. Fidget items are not standard classroom equipment. If a student feels they would benefit from using one, this must be agreed in advance by their Head of Year and/or the SENDCo, and must be linked to an identified SEND, medical, or mental health need.

Where permission is given, the item should be small and personal to the student - it must not be shared with others. It should support concentration and self-regulation, and must not distract others from learning. Items that could cause damage or mess if broken or squeezed are not permitted.

Permission will only remain in place where the item is being used appropriately and for its intended purpose.

This approach is in line with JCQ guidance, ensuring that any support reflects a student's normal way of working, including in assessments and exams.

### Spalding High School 105th Anniversary - Essay Writing Competition

Requirements:

- Write no more than 750 words (KS3) or 1000 words (Years 10-13).
- Your chosen person can be dead or still alive, provided they were born in 1920 or after.
- Students should decide on their own criteria for judging (measuring) significance, making detailed explanations to justify their overall decision.
- A good answer will make comparative arguments, assessing the contribution of their chosen person to the impact of other significant individuals as part of their essay.
- It should be given to Mr Hemsall when complete with your name and form written clearly.
- The use of AI to help with writing or structure is strictly prohibited and if its use is found the entry will be disqualified.
- **Deadline: Friday 22nd May**

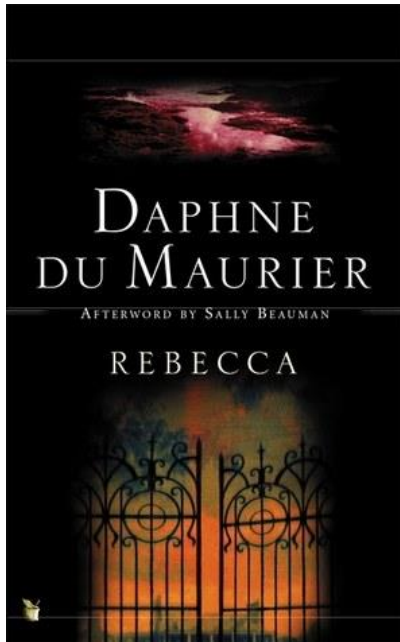

## Book reviews

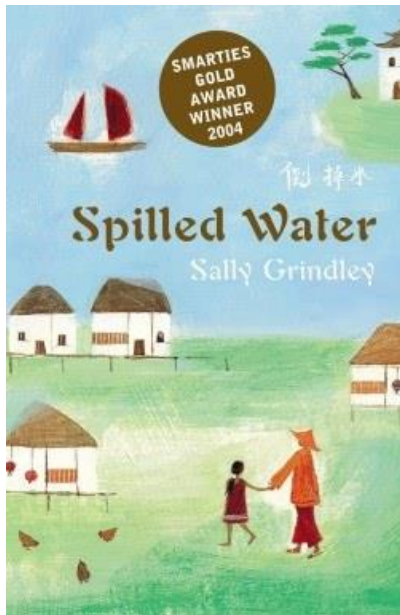


### Rebecca by Daphne Du Maurier

The book is a really great and gripping gothic novel. It's about a young woman who meets and marries a rich man, Maxim de Winter. She goes to live at his massive mansion, Manderley, but she has a lot to deal with there. The setting is incredible, Manderley is a huge, creepy mansion, full of secrets and with a dark past. The atmosphere is so vivid, you'll feel like you've wandering the windswept cliffs and peering into the shadowy corners of the estate. The mysterious Maxim de Winter and housekeeper, Mrs Danvers are super complex figures in the story. Our narrator (whose name is never given) is shy and trying to find her feet, which can make you feel for her.

Rebecca is a gothic romantic thriller that is dark and twisty and keeps you hooked. Du Maurier's writing is brilliant at building tension throughout the book. I would totally recommend it to anyone who likes dark, romantic and atmospheric stories.

### Spilled Water by Sally Grindley

Lu Si-yan grew up in poverty, managing on her father's farming income. They were a grateful family, consisting of herself, her father, her mother and her younger brother, living an adequate life in China. That was until her father passed away and her mother fell ill. Her bigoted uncle chooses an irrational decision in order for money to be made: taking Lu Si-yan to the market to be sold. The story highlights the struggles Lu Si-yan faces, from being a domestic servant to a being a factory worker. Through her journey, she truly understands the heinous way of life, especially being a young girl. Lu Si-yan's impetus to return home is the main dilemma of the story that enticed me most. Her determination kept me hooked and therefore is my favourite book out of my Year 8 reading scheme. At some points, the story had an emotional impact on me, making me feel sympathy for the young girl. At others, I was glad Lu Si-yan overcame her hardships and fended for herself showing how capable women

were (at that time they were undermined). I would recommend this book for people who are searching for a story packed with eventful twists in a multicultural book. I certainly enjoyed this and believe others will too.

## Year 7 News

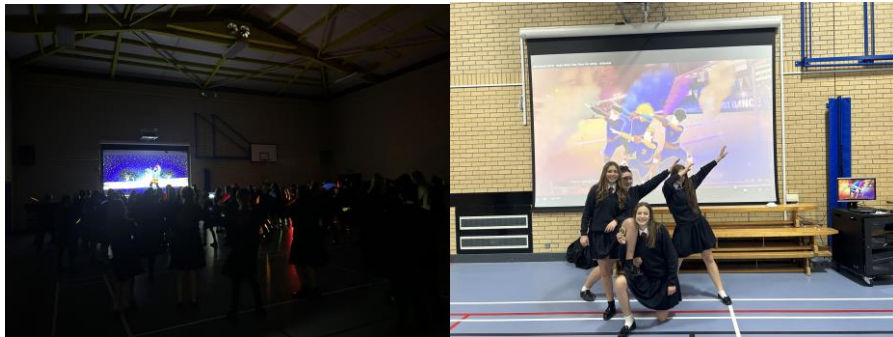
