

Spalding High School Weekly Bulletin 26th January 2023



As we are aware, the National Education Union (NEU), which is the largest teachers' union, has voted to take industrial action in the form of strikes on four days in the coming months. These dates are:

1st February

1st March

15th/16th March

Sadly, the negotiation meetings held last week did not result in resolution of the disagreement between the Government and the trade union, and so, at present, schools continue to make preparations for strike action taking place.

At the High School, we will be dealing with one strike day at a time and so the following information applies just to Wednesday 1st February:

- We fully expect school to be open to all students, all day
- Our students should attend school as normal on Wednesday 1st February, and school transport, catering and first aid provision will continue as normal
- There will be **some impact** on classes during the strike day where colleagues have made the decision to participate in the industrial action. At present this looks to be **limited** to very few colleagues and very few classes. Whilst, this is subject to change as we draw closer to the strike day, and even on the day itself (colleagues do not need to notify school of their intention to strike), we already know that there will be enough staff on site to maintain appropriate supervision of students and maintenance of effective health and safety procedures
- Where colleagues do strike, they will not be setting cover work for classes to do. This means that all students should bring the following with them on the day:
 - ♦ Homework or private study materials to complete in lessons where their teacher is striking. These lessons will be run as private study lessons such as those we have on a Friday afternoon
 - Revision materials for upcoming tests or in the case of Year 11 and Year 13, external examinations. Year 10 and Year 12 have internal examinations later this year and could start their preparation or continue wider reading around their subjects if they find their lesson is covered by Senior Staff
 - ♦ A reading book
- Classes affected by striking colleagues, will be supervised by members of the Senior Staff. We are hopeful that given the current position, those classes will be in their normal classrooms, but if the number of striking colleagues increases on the day, those classes may be held in the Sports Hall or School Hall. Students should bring their PE hoodie with them in case we are in one of the larger and cooler venues.

We will, of course, write to update you further, should the situation change, but let me reiterate, that we are expecting limited impact on a small number of classes and school will be open.

Spalding Community Alcohol Partnership Survey of Residents 2023

A partnership exists in Spalding to target underage drinking and anti-social behaviour.

CAPs are made up of partnerships between local authorities, police, schools, retailers, neighbourhood groups and health providers, working together to tackle alcohol-related harm to young people and improve the quality of life for residents.



The CAP works closely with the local schools to take a proactive approach to alcohol education, to ensure that young people are equipped to make the right decisions about issues including drugs, anti-social and criminal behaviour.

It also works with local retailers to help them avoid making underage sales and reduce 'proxy' sales where adults buy alcohol for under-18s.

The Partnership would like residents to complete this short survey. It will help them to understand where public concerns are and help direct their work to resolve the issues.

Parental drop off and pick up

Can we respectfully remind all parents/carers that they are **not to bring vehicles** onto School property at the start and end of the day to pick up their children. Only those with previously agreed medical dispensation (for example a broken leg) may use the visitor bays outside reception and only when a medical needs plan has been agreed with the Head of Year.

Can we also remind parents that the parking restrictions at the front of the School apply. Cars should not be dropping off on the zig zag lines or bus bays, and the Matmore Gate drive way is not to be used as a turning circle. The School Transport Plan is available on the School website and we would ask parents to abide by these procedures in order to keep our students as safe as possible.
