I hope that you all had a restful and relaxing half term break and have been able to recharge your batteries ready for Term 2 and the run up to Christmas!

As you will read in this week's bulletin, half term provided an exciting time for 45 of our Y10-Y13 students and six members of staff as they headed off to Iceland for a five day expedition. I was fortunate enough to accompany the group and want to say a massive thank you to Mrs Rogers for organising such an amazing adventure and to the staff and students for making it such an enjoyable trip. It was my first trip to Iceland, having had two previous fieldtrips cancelled over the years by various volcanic eruptions and so I was very excited to finally be going, although for a while, Storm Babet seemed to be a threat. As we left school on the Thursday, flights to Iceland had been cancelled, however, by the early hours of Friday morning (we left Spalding Bus Station at 1.30am!), flights had at least resumed. We had some turbulence on route and upon arrival were held on the tarmac unable to disembark as flights had again been stopped due to the high winds but apart from some very heavy rain that first morning, the weather was glorious which made all the difference given the amount of time we spent outside. I have lost count of the number of Geography fieldtrips I have done over the course of my career and I honestly cannot recall the last time that I was in awe of the landscape (geomorphological) features I could see. I will admit that there were a number of times I could be heard saying things like "oh my word, just look at the plunge pool" or "wow, look at that slip-off slope!" and the like. I make no apologies, the landscape was inspiring, impressive and unique; at times, bleak and harsh and at others, stunningly beautiful. If you have not visited Iceland before, go. I certainly intend to go back. The expedition was made all the more enjoyable by our incredibly knowledgeable tour guide, Marta, who was able to tell us everything about all that we saw and more. Students also benefited from having their Geography teachers with them, making connections with what had been learnt in the classroom and not to miss out, there was even a moment coming down from one of the volcanoes we had climbed where I could hear Mrs Lord and Y11 doing revision on Macbeth! On the way back from a late night stroll one evening, I was bringing up the rear of the group (the task I have had for more than 33 years on Geography Fieldtrips!) when an American couple following us said to me "you have your hands full with that lot there"; "Not at all" I replied, "They are an absolute pleasure and great to be with" and I meant it. The company was great, from singing on the coach, to singling in the middle of no-where hunting the Northern Lights, to laughing on the beach, encouraging each other up the volcanoes, to playing games like what is your favourite dessert, starter, biscuits etc., to making up collective nouns or just standing in awe at the scenery, our students were a delight, good humoured (even on little sleep on our travel days) and, as I told the Americans, an absolute pleasure to be with. SHS Trips

Iceland - Penelope Baxter, 6LH

Iceland is one of the most beautiful countries I have ever visited, the rural landscape was so different and amazing. Once we had met with our lovely tour guide, Marta, it was straight into sightseeing. First we visited the bridge between continents where we geographically entered the North American continent and then we saw a natural hot spring that Icelandic people believe is caused by an angry troll called Gunner. My highlight from Day One was the flyover which was a virtual experience where we got to see Iceland which was a great flavour of what the trip had in store. My favourite day was Day Three because of the range of activities that we did, and as I forgot to check the itinerary each day also had a lot of cool surprises! We started by walking up a volcanic crater and the views were amazing, so vast especially in comparison with flat Lincolnshire. Then, we visited the lava falls which is a series of powerful waterfalls all of a vivid turquoise colour. The plunge pools were mesmerising! After this we went on a trip to some caves, we had a fantastic tour guide called Gareth and despite not having worked there long he was able to answer all our questions about the eruptions that had shaped the caves. To finish the day we went to a very luxurious geothermal spa with six different pools of varying temperatures. My favourite was the toasty 40-41

degree one and it was lovely to relax and watch the sunset. It was all round a really exciting adventure, from the immense waterfalls to extensive landforms there was a lot of geography to take note of, but I also was really grateful to experience it all with some great people. I would like to especially thank Mrs Rogers for organising it all – it was definitely worth the wait!

The trip to Iceland last week was a great chance to explore some very different terrain than what we are used to in England! While walking around, it was interesting for me personally to see (and take pictures of, of course) the gorgeous scenery which was almost exclusively made of basalt, moss and mountain birch trees. While we visited many unforgettable places over the five days, including the famous Lava Falls, the picturesque Kerid Crater, and Flyover Iceland, an immersive and beautiful flying experience, my personal highlights from the trip were getting to see the Strokkur geyser (even though we got drenched due to standing too close when it erupted); Thingvellir National Park, where we were able to walk between the Eurasian and North American tectonic plates and get an incredible view of the landscape, and the Krauma Geothermal baths, where we had the chance to relax in six luxurious geothermal pools of different temperatures after a long day of walking.

Throughout the trip we were very fortunate in that we had clear skies and good weather for most of our stay. Although, unfortunately, we did not get to see the Northern Lights first-hand this year, we were able to make the most of our outdoor excursions. The Iceland trip was such an amazing opportunity and I am very grateful to have been able to take part in it!

National Language Competition 6-10 November 2023

What is GCHQ?

GCHQ is one of the three UK Intelligence and Security Agencies, along with MI5 and the Secret Intelligence Service (MI6). GCHQ protects the UK and its citizens from individuals, groups and countries who wish to do us harm, or damage us financially. GCHQ intelligence keeps our deployed forces safe and helps law-enforcement agencies to prevent terrorist activity and serious and organised crime.

What is the National Language Competition?

GCHQ's National Language Competition (NLC) is a 5-day event from **6 November to 10 November 2023**. The NLC is aimed at **Year 9** across the UK.

It involves teams of up to four pupils working together to tackle a variety of fun, immersive, language-themed challenges hosted on a virtual platform. Schools will be able to submit as many teams as they wish.

Teams can log in to the platform at anytime between 07:00 and 18:00 during the five days of the competition to (for example during lunchtimes, before or after school etc.) to have a go at the puzzles on the platform. Competitors will tackle a range of language-related puzzles, ranging from easy to difficult. You'll encounter European languages, languages less commonly taught in schools and even made-up languages! Over a period of five days, pupils will capture flags to earn points on their language journey. Points will be totalled up to generate rankings on a national leaderboard. The team with the most points at the end of the competition wins! During the competition itself, teachers will be able to see how teams are performing via a scoreboard on the platform.

The winning team will have the opportunity to be presented with a trophy in GCHQ's headquarters in Cheltenham. All pupils will be able to take part, no prior knowledge is required, only a keenness for languages. The team with the most points at the end of the competition will be invited to GCHQ's Headquarters in Cheltenham and will be presented with a trophy. If you would like to compete, then assemble your team and register your interest by speaking to the Languages Department.


Celebrating The Individual in the Sixth Form - Eliza Rudd, 6AB
