
Y8 Hockey

Join local artist, Liz Kelleher of A+E Collaborative at Ayscoughfee Museum to create a recycled plastic bottle 'waterfall'.



Odd Balls Presentation on Testicular Cancer

On Thursday the 25th of January, Josh from Odd Balls Testicular Cancer Awareness came into Spalding High School for our Sixth Form PSHE presentation. As students from an all-girls secondary school and a mixed sixth form with the majority of it being made up of young women, it was extremely beneficial to be educated on something such as testicular cancer that most of us don't even have to consider. Taking into account that one in three people get cancer at least once in their lifetime, we learnt not only about the symptoms of this particular cancer but also how to self-check for it.





Odd Balls was originally an underwear brand that would give to testicular cancer charities, before eventually making their own charity to ensure the money is well spent. They have 50 university ambassadors and deliver over 1000 awareness sessions (ours included) which reach over 150,000 people each year; they also distribute over 30,000 'Check Yourself' guides and cushions into the community, but this information can also be widely accessed from their website.

Overall, the presentation we received was highly informative. Josh answered lots of questions, which had us all engaged, and I think it's safe to say that we all learnt something new (even if almost all of us aren't directly affected many of our loved ones could be!).
